## Requirements for and the composition of the final grade / credit test:

Requirements for assessment:

Attendance in Welcome Week and Final Week, seminars and lectures and study trips.

In case a student is not able to participate in a study trip (for example, due to illness or force majeure), the student has to negotiate the extra work with the lecturer.

<u>Assessment form</u>: The subject is assessed in a differentiated assessment (grades A-F).

<u>The differentiated assessment</u> is based on the portfolio on internal security that includes a student's analysis of the subject after each study trip and an overall comparison between the internal security field of Estonia and in the student's homeland (what is done in the same way, what could be changed etc). The portfolio includes at least 3 different points of comparison and an analysis of the student's choice of specialisation (police, rescue, boarder guard, customs, justice system). The portfolio should include an analysis of at least 2 pages meeting the citing and formal requirements after each study trip (incl. pictures, videos etc). The portfolio is submitted via Moodle.

The grade is formed on the basis of the following criteria:

- A student has participated in the subject and the portfolio is correct and submitted via Moodle.
- B student has not participated in all study trips, but the portfolio if completed correctly.
- C student has participated at least in 2 study trips but has submitted the portfolio on the minimum level.
- D student has participated at least on 1 study trips but has submitted the portfolio on the minimum level.
- E student has not participated in the study trips but has submitted the portfolio on the minimum level.
- F student has not participated in the subject and has not submitted the portfolio.
